Handling Stress

During the election process and throughout the year as a State FFA Officer, there will be stressful times. Between important events, lots of hard work being invested, and planning and preparation, there is a lot for your students to manage; their schedules will be jam-packed! Understand your son or daughter could be feeling overwhelmed, so please be there for your child if they are stressed out or need someone to talk with. At the same time, understand that being in FFA provides students with a strong network of supporters, so they might be communicating with others as well. If elected, your child will become part of a very close family of teammates, and they will support each other in good times and bad.

Communication

Along the same lines as 'stress', your child's communication patterns might change a lot over the next year. They will likely be staying up late, waking up early, and working long hours. Make sure to check in with your child and understand that they are busy individuals.
